37.3 CALL FOR COLLABORATION IN MULTI-LINGUAL PROJECT

>From Murray Spiegel, July 1, 1996:

I'm involved with a cross-cultural linguistics project to translate a brief non-technical text (6 sentences) into as many languages as possible. The project is a volunteer, non-profit effort without commercial intentions, i.e. strictly educational.

There has been strong interest in our project and we would like to expand what we have. Although we have over 115 languages, we currently have very little representation from Native American and African languages.

>From North America, we only have Crow, Chippewa/Ojibway, and Chinook, and may receive Lakota and Oneida in the near future. For African languages, we have Afrikaans, Akan, Amharic, Bali/Bulu, Krio, Makhuwa-Metto, Somali, Swahili, and Zulu. Of course, we are interested in obtaining translations in lesser-used languages of other continents as well.

If anyone can translate the text using their knowledge of languages, that would help us. If there is easy access to a primary speaker, then, of course, we prefer primary sources for the translations and readings. As this is often extremely difficult, we turn to the linguistics community for help.

If you are reasonable facile in a lesser-used language and can spare what would be about 20 minutes, please let me know what language(s) you might be able to offer to our archive. (This project is not connected with my Speech Technology work at Bellcore.)
