The \*2006 People's Poetry Gathering,\* sponsored by City Lore and Poets House, will center around a special theme, "Poetry from the World's Endangered Languages." The Gathering is part of a multi-pronged initiative to document and disseminate some of the world's endangered oral poetry traditions through public programs, publications and the web, spanning the chasm of language.

The People's Poetry Gathering invites poets working in threatened, contested, stateless, and endangered languages to submit work for consideration for:

The Poetry Map of the World (website)

Curated by the New York-based People's Poetry Gathering, this website features work by contemporary poets working in non-majority languages. The map focuses on language and cultural areas rather than national boundaries and includes selected poems and song cycles from the traditions from which the poets have emerged.

The 2006 People's Poetry Gathering Program Magazine

Published by Rattapallax Press (http://www.rattapallax.com/) during the New York festival in May 2006, this magazine will be distributed to the Gathering's audience of 10,000 and to Rattapallax's subscribers, as well as to communities and academic institutions where endangered languages are spoken.

Languages to be considered include (but are not limited to) threatened languages (such as Welsh, Tibetan, Yiddish); contested languages (such as Australian Aboriginal Kreole, Romani); stateless languages (such as Catalan, Mapuche, Kurdish); and endangered languages (such as Ainu,

Mohawk, Sami, Haida, Sharda Script, Cucapás).

Languages which will NOT be considered include the official languages of the United Nations (English, French, Spanish, Russian, Chinese, Arabic); languages with a high number of speakers and majority status in specific geographic regions (Bengali, Javanese); state languages (Norwegian, Korean); and dialects of majority languages (Spanglish, Franglais).

I will be leading a panel at the next American Comparative Literature Association conference in Princeton, NJ , March 23-26 2006 on "Indigenous Language Rights Movements and the Growth of Indigenous Language Literature in Central and South America." I would like to invite members of SSILA to submit paper proposals.

Language rights of indigenous peoples are protected to varying degrees by many national constitutions, international treaties and declarations. However, indigenous language literature holds a precarious place in the literature marketplace, a function of the issues confronting the language community itself: official language status, socio-political and economic status, education and literacy, access to media and publishing, shift from oral to written tradition, the existence of a viable reading public. Indigenous language writers express differing opinions about the personal significance and the cultural implications of writing in their native language. Some are leaders in political indigenous rights movements and assert their language rights in their language, while others choose to write in a dominant language, in a style which expresses their cultural and linguistic identity. Papers in this panel may focus on individual indigenous authors and their relationship to their language(s), or on the specific issues confronting the growth of written indigenous language literature.

The 2nd annual Conference on Endangered Languages and Cultures of Native

America (CELCNA-2) will be held March 31-April 2, 2006, on the University of Utah campus in Salt Lake City, Utah. The keynote speaker will be Victor Golla.

Papers are invited on any aspect of endangered Native American languages, in particular on documentation or revitalization. Native American participants are especially invited. Papers are 20 minutes each in length, with an additional 10 minutes for discussion.

The deadline for receipt of abstracts is Jan. 16, 2006. The program committee will attempt to provide notification of acceptance by Jan. 30 (by e-mail).

#### Features to note:

Session in Spanish (ponencias en español): One session will be set aside on Sunday morning, April 2, for papers in Spanish. Abstracts in Spanish (or English) can be submitted for consideration for this session. (Due to popular demand.)

Posters: Abstracts are also invited for a poster session. This can include also demonstration of tools and toys for language documentation.

Forum discussions: The program will include open discussion sessions dedicated to: (1) Discussion of training for documentation of endangered languages, and employment considerations for students dedicated to work with endangered languages; (2) databasing and aids for language documentation; and (3) an open forum to address matters that arise during the conference.

### Abstract submission guidelines:

The abstract should be no more than 500 words in length. It should include the title of the paper and the name (or names) of the author/authors, together with the author's/authors' affiliation. (If the paper is accepted, this abstract will be reproduced in conference materials to be distributed to other participants.)

Abstracts should be submitted by e-mail. Submissions should be in Microsoft Word Format (.doc), Rich Text Format (RTF), or Portable Document Format (PDF). If possible, avoid special fonts (or arrange with the organizers so they can be read).

Please include with your abstract appropriate contact details, which include: contact author's name, e-mail address for the period of time from January to April 2006, and a telephone contact number.

Only one abstract per person may be submitted. (The only exception may be in instances where at least one of the papers has multiple authors.)

Each talk will be given 30 minutes for presentation and 10 minutes for questions. Presented papers will be published in the CLS Proceedings.
