Karen Sue Rolph specialized in ecological and linguistic anthropology at both U.C. Berkeley and Stanford where she completed her doctorate in 2007. Karen Sue, a scholar with Native American heritage, developed methods for mapping language, using Global Positioning Systems (GPS). She works at the intersection of language shift, traditional ecological knowledge loss, place name dynamics, and social constructions. Karen Sue is interested in the Quechuan branch of Americas' languages, especially intra-Quechua distinctions. Overseeing an active field research program near Huaraz, Peru, Karen Sue's group currently looks at ethnobiotic vocabulary loss among (a Quechua community's) children and adolescents. Known to many in the SSILA community, Karen Sue is an advocate for the rights of native peoples to speak, protect, and preserve indigenous languages (and place names). -- Richard A. Rhodes

268.7 Obituary: Thomas Smith-Stark, 1948-2009

On 17 May 2009 Thomas Smith-Stark, a linguist at El Colegio de México, died from complications following surgery to remove a cancerous tumor in his lungs. Born in Lowell, Massachusetts, in 1948, Thom studied under Norman McQuown at the University of Chicago, receiving his doctorate in 1983 with a thesis "Jilotepequeño Pocoman phonology and morphology". After teaching for four years at Tulane University (1976-1980), he began working at El Colegio de México in 1981, where he remained for 28 years. He studied, taught, or advised students on many language of Mexico and Guatemala, including Amuzgo, Chatino, Nahuatl, North American Sign Language, Mixteco, Pocoman, and Zapotec, and will be remembered for the breadth of his interests, depth of his scholarship and, particularly, dedication to his students. He is survived by his wife of 32 years, María Esperanza Aguilar, and his two daughters, Sandra Elizabeth (born 1979) and Ana Eugenia (born 1983). He will be lovingly remembered and deeplv missed. – Jonathan Amith
